

Is My Student "Trip Ready"?

Oya No Kai is committed to ensuring that all students who ready to travel based on trip requirements can participate. We will accommodate unique student needs as possible within the constraints of resources available to Oya No Kai, trip directors, chaperones, and our hosting establishments in Japan. Every effort will be made to make sure all trip participants have a safe travel abroad experience.

Is My Student "Trip Ready"?

Take the information you hear tonight seriously. Be thoughtful and honest about whether or not you believe your student can handle the situations we describe, and make a decision that will ensure their joy, safety, and success.

Is My Student "Trip Ready"?

Five Areas of Readiness

- Travel
- Academic
- Social and Emotional
- Homestay
- Family

Travel Ready

"Really hard to know who will do well—in a few cases, kids that one wouldn't expect much homesickness [from] absolutely lost it for a couple days. Conversely, a few different kids rose to the challenge like they've never done in a classroom."

Travel Ready

Travel ready means your student:

- functions adequately on less than 8 hours sleep and on an irregular sleep schedule
- does not require a regular daily schedule
- handles last minute changes without anxiety
- has a flexible diet
- does not typically suffer from homesickness
- has been successfully away overnight from their parents/family
- has the physical stamina for sightseeing (long walks and bus rides)
- can handle heat and humidity
- does not have issues with traveling by plane, train, bus or automobile.

Academic Ready

"Had a student that rocked the classroom. In 4th grade she began feeling very stressed, stomach aches, etc. Family figured out that it was the trip on her mind that was causing real anxiety. Family pulled kid [from trip] and she bounced right back — no regrets. Still in JMP."

Academic Ready

Academic ready means your student:

- is comfortable listening and interacting in Japanese.
- readily tries to use Japanese to the best of their ability.
- interacts with and respects all of their classmates.
- behaves properly in the classroom and is not disruptive.
- handles conflicts with peers appropriately.
- is willing and able to ask for help when needed.
- follows instructions from adults readily (teachers and volunteers) in Japanese and English.

Social and Emotional Ready

"A student was not able to function without one-on-one support for multiple days—this lead to teacher-in-residence having to spend most of their time supporting one student, and not being available for others. A big ask for a parent volunteer-led trip to be responsible for this high need kiddo."

Social and Emotional Ready

Social/emotional ready means your student:

- wants to go on the 5th Grade trip to Japan (you've asked them).
- wants to homestay with Japanese families (you've asked them).
- wants to make good friends with Japanese students.
- works well with students who are not their closest friends.
- understands and maintains appropriate boundaries regarding nudity and sexual expression.
- consistently and without prompting says please and thank you in English and in Japanese.

Homestay Ready

"A couple kids ate only white rice for 10 days...no energy at all, lead to bad choices and kids were miserable. Homestay families and chaperones were very concerned—added quite a bit of stress to that trip."

"We had students who could not use utensils properly, ate with their hands, would not sit at the dinner table, and would not interact with their host siblings. This resulted in a few very sad host students and disgruntled host families - makes it hard to recruit future families to offer homestays..."

Homestay Ready

Homestay ready means your student:

- has proper table manners.
- can sit at a table respectfully for a meal for at least 20-30 minutes.
- can manage their own hygiene independently and without making a mess – bathing, toilet use, tooth brushing.
- can go to sleep with no lights or minimal lights on, and does not require an unusually particular sleeping environment.

Family Ready

"We always just assumed our child wanted to go on the 5th grade trip. When we sat down and asked the question, 'do you want to go?' we were shocked when they said 'no'."

"It was hard for me to understand why, if my child was homesick, they couldn't call me."

Family Ready

Family ready means:

- we've asked our child whether or not they wish to participate in the 5th Grade Exchange and they answered, "yes".
- we will fully disclose social/emotional/medical information about our child to be shared with all the trip leadership.
- we trust the trip directors, teachers in residence, and all chaperones to care for our child while in Japan..
- we understand and accept that once our child leaves for Japan we will not be able to communicate with them.
